# November is American Diabetes Month

D iabetes is a disease in which the body does not produce or properly use insulin. Insulin is a hormone that is needed to convert sugar, starches and other food into energy needed for daily life. The cause of diabetes is a mystery, although genetics and factors such as obesity and lack of exercise appear to play a role in this disease. There are 18.2 million people in the United States who have diabetes, unfortunately 1/3 of them are unaware that they have the disease.

Often diabetes goes undiagnosed because many of its symptoms seen so harmless. Early detection and treatment of diabetes can decrease the chance of developing complications of diabetes. Some diabetes

# Celiac Disease

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C eliac disease (CD) is one of the most common inherited disorders (one in 133 people in the United States have CD) – however, it is estimated that 90-95% of these people have not yet been diagnosed. The symptoms of the disease vary a lot from person to person – and can be similar to symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome, lactose intolerance, chronic fatigue syndrome, and diverticulosis.

Proteins from wheat, rye and barley trigger damage in the small intestine. This, in turn, can lead to deficiencies of iron, folic acid, calcium and Vitamins A, D, E and K. Celiac disease is also linked to an increased risk of osteoporosis, infertility and some cancers of the gut. If a person has Type 1 diabetes, osteoporosis, Down syndrome, Turner syndrome, lymphoma, autoimmune thyroid disease – you are at an increased risk of CD.

Symptoms can occur at any age and can by triggered by events such as pregnancy, surgery, infection, or severe emotional stress. The number and severity symptoms include:

- Frequent urination,
- Excessive thirst,
- Extreme hunger,
- Unusual weight loss,
- Increased fatigue,
- Irritability,
- Blurry vision

If you have one or more of these diabetes symptoms, you need to see your health care provider right away. Annie Jeffrey Health Center offers a wellness program on Diabetes Education. During the Diabetes Education classes, students learn about symptoms, medication, blood glucose monitoring, exercise and meal planning. Physician referral is required for these classes. Call Annie Jeffrey Health Center at 402-747-2031 to get tested for diabetes or for answers to your health related questions.

of symptoms vary greatly from one person to another. The following symptoms may occur alone or in combination:

- Anemia
- Deficiency of vitamin A,D,E,K
- Abdominal pain, gas, bloating, cramping
- indigestion
- recurring/persistent diarrhea
- constipation
- extreme weakness and fatigue
- weight loss
- lactose intolerance
- dermatitis herpetiformis
- elevated liver enzymes
- frequent canker sores
- easy bruising
- bone/joint pain
- edema of feet and hands
- menstrual irregularities
- infertility in both men and women
- recurrent miscarriages
- migraine
- depression
- peripheral neuropathy

# Annie Jeffrey Memorial County Health Center Annual Report 2013

P atients and community members come to us in need and honor us with their trust. They place their health, and often even their lives, in our hands. We take that responsibility seriously and ensure our patients receive quality, personalized and compassionate health care in a safe and efficient manner.

We continue to develop our work plan in conjunction with our strategic plan. Our Balanced Score Card gives us measurable information that allows us to track how we are doing in the areas of Financial Performance, Community and Customers, Internal Processes and Our People (Employees). We also continue our work in the areas of customer service excellence, provider recruitment and retention, communication with the public, expansion of services, and retaining a high quality workforce.

# The following is a summary of activities for the past year:

- Awarded Helmsley Trust eEmergency grant of \$307,286, a program that gives physicians immediate access to specialty care 24 hours a day. The grant was used to implement eEmergency technology and improve access to specialty services. eEmergency ensures that board-certified emergency physicians and emergency-trained nurses are available to assist local providers in treating trauma, heart attack, stroke, and other critical conditions.
- Continued October Mammograms incentives program
- Implemented ePharmacy which provides around-the-clock access to remote pharmacy support at Annie Jeffrey Health Center. The ePharmacist reviews prescriptions when the on-staff pharmacist is not available. This new system provides a safe and effective method of prescription delivery to our patients.
- Finished Values Collaborative and Meaningful Use Training for staff
- AJ Volunteers held their 17 year anniversary celebration at the Thrift Shop

- AJ Volunteers received the 2013 First Lady's Outstanding Community Service Award
- Strategic Planning continued for the next three years
- Hosted the Foundation Family Tree Celebration
- Foundation for Annie Jeffrey held a wine tasting event in February with proceeds to be used for Phase III of the remodeling project
- Worked on Master Facility Plan and presented to Board of Directors
- Snowman Marathon Wellness Program was well attended
- Annie Jeffrey awarded a silver medal for low Workman's Comp claims from Nebraska Hospital Association
- Foundation for Annie Jeffrey received a \$10,000 Verizon grant to help with ePharmacy program

### AJ Health Fair

he tenth annual Annie Jeffrey Memorial County Fall Health Fair held on October 1st was a huge success. Over 200 fairgoers, from a variety of Nebraska communities, visited the health exhibits with 154 taking advantage of the discounted comprehensive health blood profiles. Fifteen anatomy/biology students from two local schools took advantage of the educational opportunities available through the health fair. A continental breakfast was provided by Annie Jeffrey's dietary staff.

The health fair is designed to be an event where people can learn about their own health and obtain information about services provided in the area. Participants were able to visit different booths where vendors provided free body fat analysis, oximetry, blood typing, blood pressure screening, skin cancer screening, and colon cancer screening kits were available.

Seventy four adults and children received their seasonal flu vaccination

Diagnosis of celiac disease cannot be done on symptoms alone. Initially, blood tests are available to screen people who have symptoms or have relatives with celiac disease.

Ninety-seven percent of people with celiac disease have a genetic marker that can now be used to diagnose the disease. This test requires an intestinal biopsy while eating a gluten-containing diet.

The only treatment for celiac disease is a strict gluten-free diet for life. A gluten free diet allows the gut to recover and can lower the risk of developing many of the complications of untreated celiac disease. Because of the complexity of the gluten-free diet, patients should be referred to a registered dietitian for nutrition education.

Sandra Burwell, RD, LMNT from Annie Jeffrey Health Center recently attended a class on Celiac Disease and can help with nutrition education. Regular follow-up with a physician is also recommended.
